






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Faculty of Biology

The Faculty of Biology at the University of Gdańsk has a rich history intertwined with the university since its inception in 1970.

eventually found its home at the Faculty of Biology, encompassing various fields like environmental, molecular, and marine biology, as well as biotechnology.

Today, the Faculty of Biology offers a wide range of academic programmes in Biology, Ecology, and Microbiology. It can also grant postdoctoral degrees in Biological Sciences.

With 11 departments, 23 laboratories, and two research and education stations, the faculty provides an extensive platform for scientific exploration.

Faculty of Chemistry

The Faculty of Chemistry at the University of Gdańsk has a fascinating history, dating back to 1945 when chemistry education began at the Teacher Training College. Officially founded in 1991, the faculty now comprises 11 departments and hosts 30 research laboratories.

With the authority to grant postdoctoral degrees in chemical sciences and doctoral degrees in disciplines like biochemistry and environmental protection, the faculty upholds high academic standards. It also has the privilege to nominate professors of chemical sciences.

Since 2013, the faculty has been situated in a modern and impressive facility spanning 29,000 square metres on the Oliwa campus. This state-of-the-art scientific and educational hub boasts 24 student laboratories, a technology hall, 190 scientific laboratories, and a complex of contemporary lecture halls. It stands as one of Europe's most advanced facilities, providing an exceptional environment for scientific exploration and education.

The Intercollegiate Faculty of Biotechnology UG&MUG is a unique institution in Poland created by two universities. The intercollegiate character of the Faculty allows for the use of infrastructure and expertise provided by two universities, and therefore combining the best international standards of research with the highest quality of teaching.

Faculty of History

The Faculty of History was established in 2008 and comprises three institutes: The Institute of Archaeology and Ethnology, the Institute of History, and the Institute of Art History. It provides first- and second-degree studies in seven fields: Archaeology, Ethnology, History, Art History, Regional Studies and Historic Tourism, German Studies, and Religion Studies. Furthermore, it offers Doctoral Schools and five different postgraduate courses.

Faculty of Languages

The Faculty of Languages boasts the broadest didactic offer and the largest number of staff and students at the University of Gdańsk. Our motto is 'Language in culture, culture in language'. The Faculty provides 20 fields of study related to languages, culture, the Baltic countries, Poland, and the Pomerania region. They belong to the following scientific areas: philology, neo- philology, and cultural studies. We offer 13 philology degree courses (of which 11 neo-philological), 6 cultural and artistic studies, and one, unique on a national scale, intercollegiate philological and medical course – logopaedics (in collaboration with the Medical University of Gdańsk). We provide nearly 100 areas of specialisation in the framework of 20 first- and second-cycle, full- and part-time degree courses. The Faculty offers doctoral studies and a wide range of postgraduate courses.

Faculty of Mathematics, Physics and Informatics

The Faculty consists of four Institutes, each boasting its own scientific achievements and offering specific educational possibilities.

Institute of Mathematics employs 50 scientists (including 6 full professors). Main scientific interests: real functions theory, algebra, geometry, topology, differential equations theory, probability theory, didactics of mathematics.

Institute of Informatics employs 30 scientists (including 2 full professors). Main scientific interests: combinatorics, graphs and computational geometry, scattered programming, quantum information.

Institute of Experimental Physics employs 19 researchers, (6 are full professors). Main areas of interest are: atomic spectroscopy, molecular spectroscopy, solid state physics, physics of collisions, bio- and biomedical physics, quantum interferometry, acoustics.

Institute of Theoretical Physics and Astrophysics employs
15 scientists (6 full professors). It is a renowned centre for
quantum information theory and related topics. Other
scientific interests: mathematical physics, atomic and
molecular physics, computational physics.

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


Faculty of Economics



The modern teaching and research base of the Faculty of Oceanography and Geography is located in Gdynia Campus. The Faculty has two field stations – the Marine Station in Hel and the Limnological Station in Borucino at Raduńskie Lake.

Research Vessel 'Oceanograf'

The Faculty of Oceanography and Geography owns
'Oceanograf' – a specialised research vessel whose home port
is Gdynia. This is one of the most modern research vessels
operating in the Baltic Sea region, and it can also be used for
commercial purposes.

The catamaran is fully equipped for interdisciplinary research in the fields of environment and wildlife of the Baltic Sea.

Inside the ship are laboratories, observatories, and seminar rooms for students. A variety of research is carried out using the ship, including seabed bathymetry, chemical, or geological research.

The Seal Center is part of the Professor Krzysztof Skóra Marine Station belonging to the University of Gdańsk. It's a great idea for a one-day trip to visit the Hel Peninsula.







UG Main Library

The University of Gdańsk's Library is both an academic unit and a hub for the University's information system. Located in Gdańsk-Oliwa, it is the main component of the academic library system, supported by six specialised libraries. Legalisation of your stay in Poland

In the Welcome Centre we can help you with Legalisation of your stay in Poland!

EU citizens don't need a visa to study in Poland. They are allowed to stay without any official permission for up to 3 months.

Those willing to stay longer have to obtain a certificate of temporary residence for an EU citizen from Voivodship Office in Gdansk.



Legalisation of stay in Poland - EU Countries

- EU, EFTA and OECD citizens are obliged to register their residence within 3 months from the day of arrival to Poland.

- · Required documents:

copy of insurance policy , e.g. European Health Insurance Card (EHIC);

confirmation of financial means;



Non-EU/EEA citizens may enter Poland with a valid travel document (passport) and a visa (if required/subject to the country of origin). The visas can be obtained from the Polish consulate in the student's country of residence.

Students are obligated to apply for a visa for the whole period of their stay in Poland.

Legalisation of stay in Poland – non-EU Countries

- Application form for the temporary residence permit;
- Passport copy;
- · Confirmation of registration at the University of Gdansk Dean's Office;
- · Confirmation of payment for studies International Office;
- Health insurance covering treatment in Poland (If it's issued in language other than Polish, it has to be translated to Polish by sworn translator);
- · Confirmation of sufficient financial support.

Health Insurance



EU students are required to obtain a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) issued in their home country valid for the whole period of their stay at the UG. For more information please visit the web page of Polish National Health Fund (NFZ).

Non-EU students are required to obtain commercial health insurance, valid for the whole period of their stay at the UG; it must provide coverage for medical expenses, treatment and assistance in transportation that might be required in emergencies. Another option is getting a Polish National Insurance (NFZ), which will provide you with complete health assistance.



Transport to UG



The train station is located outside of the arrival hall, straight across from the exit. The tickets can be purchased from the ticket machines located at the terminal or on the train platform.

Option 1. Travelling by REG train from Gdańsk Port Lotniczy to Strzyża station: Option 2. Travelling by REG & SKM train from Gdańsk Port Lotniczy to

- \cdot Ride for around 16 min (7 stops),
- · Get off the train at Strzyża station,
- Take the tram from Strzyża PKM 01 tram station (No. 5, 6 or 12) for around 2 minutes (2 stops),
- \cdot Get off at Bażyńskiego 01 station.
- Or Ride 4 minutes (2 stops).



Option 2. Travelling by REG & SKM train from Gdańsk Port Lotniczy to Gdańsk Przymorze Uniwersytet station.

- · Ride for around 21 minutes (8 stops),
- · Get off at Gdańsk Wrzeszcz station,
- · Change to SKM train towards Gdańsk Przymorze Uniwersytet station,
- · Ride 4 minutes (2 stops).



By taxi

Order a taxi via an app and ride ~ 12km.









The nearest tram stops to the campus: 'Uniwersytet Gdański' and 'Bażyńskiego' (trams number 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, 12).



The nearest bus stops to the campus: 'Przymorze SKM' (buses number 199, 249, 149) and 'Biblioteka UG' (buses number 199, 122).



All 3 cities are well connected by SKM – Tricity Rapid Rail. The nearest SKM stop to the UG is 'Gdańsk Przymorze Uniwersytet'.

The Tricity is served by only one SKM line.







Climate and weather

The local climate is significantly influenced by the Baltic Sea. During the summer, prevailing winds come from the west and northwest. Conversely, in the winter, winds predominantly arrive from the mainland. The winter season also brings storm winds from the sea, carrying a substantial amount of moisture to the urban area. This phenomenon results in a perceived temperature much colder than the actual reading on the thermometer.

Gdańsk experiences pleasant and partially cloudy summers, while its winters are extended, marked by intense cold, snowfall, strong winds, and predominantly cloudy skies.

According to the tourism score, the optimal period for engaging in warmweather activities in Gdańsk is from late June to late August.











Public transport

Public Transport in Gdąńsk and Tricity is very well organised. The main means of transport in Tricity is the SKM railway, which connects all three cities and is the fastest means of transport. Additionally, trams and buses are also available. Public transport operates both day and night, weekends and holidays. If you are a student, you can use your student ID to get a discount on tickets.

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Water tram (pol. Tramwaj Wodny) (connections to seaside resorts) - water trams travel between stops in Tricity and on Hel Peninsula. Stops are: Kościuszko Square in Gdynia, The Molo (Pier) in Sopot, and the Motława in Gdańsk.



Shopping

Various kinds of stores can be found in Poland. The most popular chain stores are: Carrefours, Kaufland, Lidl, Aldi, Netto, Intermarche and Biedronka (eng. 'a ladybug'). Home improvement and construction products can be found in Castorama, Leroy Merlin, Ikea, Jysk and Obi. In Tricity, there are several shopping malls, but the most popular and largest ones are Forum Gdańsk in Gdańsk city centre, Galeria Bałtycka in Gdańsk-Wrzeszcz, and Riviera in Gdynia. Apart from shopping, these malls offer a wide range of services, including banks, restaurants, gyms, and cinemas.

Expect shorter opening hours of shops on Saturdays than on weekdays, and some stores remain closed on Sundays. You should know that most of the gas stations are open 24/7 including holidays, and they usually allow some basic grocery and food shopping.

Cultural life



The capital of the Pomeranian region, a city of more than a thousand years of tradition, the symbolic spot where the Second World War started. When you visit Gdańsk, you'll see right away the beauty of the architecture of the Old Town and you'll be able to enjoy a wide range of culture, from museums to lots of monuments, but Gdańsk is not just about history. It's a city throbbing with life. You'll find here all the entertainment and good food that come with any large city.

What's worth seeing?



ZOO – come to see the Tricity's zoo. On its 120ha site, you'll be able to look at exotic animals from all the continents of the world.

Oliwa Park – the last of what was once a whole set of city parks. Here you'll find peace and quiet in one of the avenues, Botanical Garden or in the Palm House.

Oliwa Cathedral – founded in 1186. Oliwa Cathedral in Gdańsk has undergone many changes in the course of its existence. It's a combination of styles from Romanesque through Gothic and Baroque right up to the modern. It's the longest church in Poland.

City of Gaansk Historical Museum.

The Neptune Fountain – this symbol of Gdańsk stands in the Main Town. The statue of the King of the Sea in its middle dates from

The Town Hall (pol. Ratusz) – there's no precise date for the building of the Town Hall., but it's estimated that the first phase of the construction took place in the years 1379-1382. At present, it holds the headquarters of the

Westerplatte – where the Second World War started. You can visit the cemetery of the Polish soldiers who died here in 1939, Guardhouse no. 1, the ruins of the barracks, Guardhouse no. 3, a tank, and the Westerplatte Monument that was built after the War.




St. Mary's Basillica (pol Bazylika Mariacka) – this is the largest brick Gothic place of worship in Europe.

Arthur's Court (pol. Dwór Artusa) – built between 1476 and 1481, it was a place of meetings, banquets, weddings. Plays were performed here, too. From 1742, it was a stock-exchange.

Long Market (pol. Długi Targ) – walking through Długi Targ, you feel the unique atmosphere of Gdańks's Main Town with its distinctive architecture and its wide range of entertainment and fine dining. Długa Street, which runs perpendicularly to the Motława River from the Golden Gate to the Green Gate, is a must-see.

European Solidarity Center – the Center celebrates the people and the ideas that helped to build civil society in Poland. It's a meeting place for people who care about the future of the world. It's a venue for conferences, debates, projects for children and young people, plays, and film shows. It also offers a home for NGOs that work for the common good, for freedom and human rights.









Sopot

Sopot is the smallest of the Three Cities, but no less important for that. Sopot is a well- known seaside resort and spa. It never sleeps. It's a place where artists, university people, and tourists meet. Here you'll find exhibitions, concerts, festivals, conferences, and international conventions. It's famous for its wonderful beaches, its streets full of cafes, restaurants, clubs, and art galleries. It offers a breath of fresh air after a hard day in the city.

What's worth seeing?

Monte Cassino Street (commonly known as 'Monciak')

– Sopot's flagship street is one of the places most visited by tourists. Here you'll find many restaurants, pubs, clubs, and cafes.

Pier (pol. Molo) – at 315 m, it's the longest wooden pier in Europe.

The Opera in the Woods (pol. Opera Leśna) – a summer amphitheatre, covering 4 hectares, in which big Sopot concerts and festivals are held.



The Horse Race Track (pol. Hipodrom) – most days it's a place of peace and greenery, and then it bursts into throbbing life when there are riding competitions, exhibitions, and other large-scale events.



As opposed to Gdańsk, Gdynia is a relatively young city, but it is a very modern and rapidly developing one. Its modern architecture and its maritime character are distinctive. The city is throbbing with life and has many tourist attractions, such as its lovely promenades, marinas that organise boat trips, and great sea views from its nearby cliffs.

What's worth seeing?

The Sea Boulevard (pol. Bulwar nadmorski) – the Boulevard is the most popular place for a stroll in Gdynia. It's 1.5 km long and is great for just walking or for running, roller skating, or biking.

Kościuszko Square – tourists love to stroll here. It's full of different kinds of entertainment and eating places. You can visit ORP Błyskawica, a Second World War warship that's moored here. You can also see the tall-masted sailing ship Dar Pomorza. Big outdoor events are held here.

The Marina – you can really enjoy the sea here. You can take trips on the fast motor boats or sailboats, and you can gaze at the luxury yachts moored in the marina.





The Gdynia Aquarium – located on Kościuszko Square, the Gdynia Aquarium gives you a chance to see exotic fish from all over the world here in the centre of the city. The Aquarium has an extensive education programme for those who want to know more about sea life.



The Cliff Walk – if you want to get some great views, take a walk along the Gdynia Cliffs. The path runs from the pier in Orłowo to the Sea Boulevard in the centre of Gdynia.

The Pier in Orłowo – it measures 180 m and it's open the whole year free of charge.



Infobox – an information point where you can find out all about Gdynia, take part in cultural events, and take in great views from the viewing point.

Emigration Museum – the museum is dedicated to the history of Polish emigration to all continents.



Experyment Science Centre – is a place with interactive exhibitions and a space for creative experimentation for people of all ages. The centre encourages people to discover and learn about the world.

Sports & activities

If you prefer to spend your time actively, Tricity offers plenty of options. You can explore beautiful parks like Oliwa Park or Reagan Park in Gdańsk, North Park in Sopot, and Kolibki Park in Gdynia. In addition, there are swimming pools and aqua parks in the region, such as the Aquapark in Sopot, Aquapark in Reda, and pools in Gdańsk-Chełm or Gdańsk-Osowa. For sports lovers, Tricity offers a wide range of activities, including walking, jogging, cycling & rollerblading paths, skateboarding parks, shooting ranges, go-kart tracks, climbing walls, and trampoline parks.

In addition to these activities, there are places outside of Tricity that are worth visiting. The Kashubian region, for example, is famous for its majestic forests and lakes, and in winter, ski tracks are popular with the public, with the most well-known one being in Wieżyca. In the summer, the Hel Peninsula is a great place to discover watersports.







Events

Throughout the year, there are several recurring events that take place in the area. In the summertime, it's a season of music events, with the Open'er festival being one of the most popular due to world-renowned artists performing for four days. The Top of the Top Sopot Festival at Forest Opera is also an event worth attending.

Every August, Gdańsk's Old Town hosts the St. Dominic's Fair, a tradition that dates back to 1260. The fair brings together merchants from all over Poland; the visitors can admire and purchase antiques and handicrafts or watch various artistic performances. Gdańsk is also known for its Christmas Fair, which usually starts at the beginning of December.

First steps in Poland

Poland is a country in Central Europe, with Warsaw as its capital city. With a population of ~38 million people, Poland is a beautiful country with diverse landscapes including mountains, green areas, and the sea. Additionally, it has a rich and complex history and is a home to numerous museums, galleries, theatres, and operas. Polish cuisine is also renowned and includes dishes such as dumplings, noodles, meat, and potato dishes.

Language

Polish is the official language of Poland and it is estimated that it is spoken by ~44 million people worldwide. It belongs to the West Slavic group of languages, based on the Latin script, and shares linguistic ties with Czech and Slovak. The Polish alphabet comprises 32 letters, including diacritics that modify the pronunciation of letters. While learning Polish might seem challenging due to its complex grammar and unique sounds, mastering this beautiful and rich language can be rewarding for both personal and professional purposes.

If you are interested in learning Polish during your stay in Poland, you can enrol in a course offered by the Academic Centre of Polish Language and Culture for Foreigners at the University of Gdańsk. For more information, see page 51.

Currency

The currency in Poland is the Polish złoty (it can be translated as 'a piece of gold'). In the foreign exchange market, the Polish currency, known as złoty (abbreviation: zł), is symbolised as PLN. One złoty is further subdivided into 100 smaller units called grosz (abbreviation: gr). Banknotes in circulation include 10, 20, 50, 100, 200 and 500 PLN, while coins come in denominations of 1, 2, and 5 złoty and 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, 50 grosz.

Currency rates change very quickly. The best option is to check the actual one on the Polish National Bank website: https://nbp.pl/en/.

Banking

Having an account in a Polish bank definitely makes life easier. At the moment, most banks offer accounts that are free of charge if some condition is met (e.g. use of the card once a month, regular





receipts). Many Polish banks offer special accounts tailored to students. These accounts often come with benefits such as reduced fees, higher ATM withdrawal limits. Be sure to inquire about student account options when setting up your Polish bank account. Most of the bank employees also speak English, which is undoubtedly easier



Bankomat – ATM - you can withdraw money from it; most of them have explanations in English and a few other languages.

Kantor – a money exchange office; it is usually more convenient and has better rates than a bank.

Cheques are virtually obsolete in Poland, and it would likely raise eyebrows if you attempted to make a payment using this method. You may be kindly encouraged to opt for an alternative payment method.



Airports

There are 15 airports located throughout Poland, with the main port being Frederic Chopin Airport in Warsaw. It is through this airport that most international connections are made, especially outside of Europe.




